**WISC Wechsler Intelligence Scale
for Children**

<p><u>Verbal subtests</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -information -similarities -math -vocabulary -comprehension -digit span 	<p><u>Performance Subtest</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -picture arrangement -picture completion -block design -object assembly -coding -mazes

Interpretation of scores

- Average scaled score is 10
- 18 is highest - 1 is lowest scaled score
- Gives 3 IQ scores: verbal IQ, performance IQ, full scale IQ
- Look for a discrepancy between achievement, verbal and performance IQs
- Look for variability of 3 or more scaled score points in subtests

What each subtest measures:

<p><u>Verbal tests:</u></p> <p>Information</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •reflects intellectual curiosity •doesn't see the obvious <p>Similarities</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> •ability to generalize and deal with abstractness •ability to draw conclusions 	<p><u>How to help</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Plant ideas to stimulate thoughts about finding out about facts through pictures, films... •Encourage oral expression of steps in doing something •Encourage pleasure reading •Use direct teaching •Use outlines and graphic organizers to accent key facts •Teach concrete to abstract •Use classifying & categorizing
